Building Peace in Global Hot Zones of Urban Conflict - Scott A. Bollens, Ph.D., AICP, is professor, Department of Planning, Policy, and Design, University of California, Irvine and holder of the Warmington Endowed Chair in Peace and International Cooperation. He studies urbanism and inter-group conflict. He has interviewed over 220 urban professionals in Jerusalem, Belfast, Johannesburg, Nicosia (Cyprus), Sarajevo and Mostar (Bosnia), and Barcelona and Basque cities (Spain) about the role of urban policy and city building amidst nationalistic ethnic conflict and political transitions. He is author of *Cities, Nationalism, and Democratization* (Routledge Press, 2007), *On Narrow Ground: Urban Policy and Ethnic Conflict in Jerusalem and Belfast* (State University of New York Press, 2000), and *Urban Peace-Building in Divided Societies: Belfast and Johannesburg* (Westview, 1999).

Jesus has lectured to educational, cultural, non-profit, business, and civic organizations in over 30 American states and 10 additional countries around the world. His mission is to inspire personal and social healing and transformation through his speaking engagements, training seminars, and artistic endeavors, which include writing, producing, directing, and acting.

Wisdom of Leadership - Charles Royston III, an anthropological philosopher, teaches Human Services and Anthropology at CSU Fullerton. All aspects of the human condition fascinate him. His life, political activism, belief in service, and the books he writes are fueled by his personal philosophy "One Global Family: Each and every human being sees themselves in the eyes of another, regardless of different background or belief."

Intercultural Affairs - **Joumana Silyan-Saba** is a Policy Advisor for the City of Los Angeles Human Relations Commission. Through her work with the City HRC, Mrs. Silyan-Saba has developed and implemented various trainings in the areas of conflict management, cultural fluency, and human relations and presented on several panels focused on the above areas. She has also designed several programs aimed at enhancing inter-group relations and meeting the identified needs of our local communities. Joumana's current focus is on areas of inter-group relations as it pertains to interfaith relations and issues of the Middle East. Her efforts include working with the Mayor's office, faith and community leaders, civil rights organizations, and academic institutions to bridge divides and address social justice issues.

Diversity and Nonviolence in the Classroom - Vikas P. Srivastava holds a MA in Education from the Harvard Graduate School of Education and a BA in Sociology from UC San Diego. He is a two-time nominee for the Pushcart Prize and he is the Managing Director of World Parade Books, an independent publishing house based in Huntington Beach.
